

DANUBE RIVER



The Danube (/ˈdænjuːb/ dan-yoob) is a river in Central Europe, the continent's second longest after the Volga.

It rises in the Black Forest mountains of western Germany and flows for some 1,770 miles (2,850 km) to its mouth on the Black Sea. .

DANUBE RIVER



Along its course, it passes through nine countries: Germany, Austria, Slovakia, Hungary, Croatia, Serbia, Bulgaria, Romania, and Ukraine.

The Danube is navigable by ocean ships from the Black Sea to Brăila in Romania and by river ships to Kelheim, Bavaria, Germany

VANTAA RIVER



The Vantaa River (Finnish: Vantaanjoki, Swedish: Vanda å) is a 101-kilometre (63 mi) long river in Southern Finland.

The country's capital, Helsinki, uses water from the Vantaa River.

PO RIVER



Po River, Latin Padus, longest river in Italy, rising in the Monte Viso group of the Cottian Alps on Italy's western frontier and emptying into the Adriatic Sea in the east after a course of 405 miles (652 km).

PO RIVER



The river flows through many important Italian cities, including Turin (Torino), Piacenza and Ferrara.

VANTAA RIVER

The river starts from the lake Erköylänjärvi in Hausjärvi and flows into the Gulf of Finland in Helsinki

For hundreds of years the Vantaanjoki River has been known for its sea trout and salmon.
